ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION OF

THE BRITISH ASSOCIATION OF UROLOGICAL SURGEONS LIMITED

1. <u>Name</u>

The name of the **Charity** is The British Association of Urological Surgeons Limited.

2. <u>Registered Office</u>

The registered office of the Charity is to be situated at 35/43 Lincoln's Inn Fields, London WC2A 3PE.

3. Objects

The **Objects** are to promote the highest standard in the practice of Urology for the benefit of patients by fostering education, research and clinical excellence.

4. Powers

The Charity has the following powers, which may be exercised only in promoting the Objects:

- 4.1 To promote or carry out research.
- 4.2 To provide advice.
- 4.3 To publish or distribute information.
- 4.4 To co-operate with other bodies.
- 4.5 To support, administer or set up other charities.
- 4.6 To raise funds (but not by means of taxable trading).
- 4.7 To borrow money and give security for loans (but only in accordance with the restrictions imposed by the **Charities Act**).
- 4.8 To acquire or hire property of any kind.
- 4.9 To let or dispose of property of any kind (but only in accordance with the restrictions imposed by the Charities Act).

- 4.10To make grants or loans of money and to give guarantees.
- 4.11To set aside funds for special purposes or as reserves against future expenditure.
- 4.12To deposit or invest in funds in any manner (but to invest only after obtaining such advice from a **financial expert** as the **Trustees** consider necessary and having regard to the suitability of investments and the need for diversification).
- 4.13To delegate the management of investments to a financial expert, but only on terms that:
- the investment policy is set down in writing for the financial expert by the Trustees;
- (2) every transaction is reported promptly to the Trustees,
- the performance of the investments is reviewed regularly with the Trustees;
- the Trustees are entitled to cancel the delegation arrangement at any time;
- (5) the investment policy and the delegation arrangement are reviewed at least once a **year**;
- (6) all payments due to the financial expert are on a scale or at a level which is agreed in advance and are notified promptly to the Trustees on receipt; and
- (7) the financial expert must not do anything outside the powers of the Trustees.
 - 4.14To arrange for investments or other property of the Charity to be held in the name of a **nominee company** acting under the control of the Trustees or of a financial expert acting under their instructions, and to pay any reasonable fee required.
 - 4.15To deposit documents and physical assets with any company registered or having a place of business in England and Wales as **custodian**, and to pay any reasonable fee required.
 - 4.16To insure the property of the Charity against any foreseeable risk and take out other insurance policies to protect the Charity when required.

- 4.17To pay for indemnity insurance for the Trustees.
- 4.18Subject to clause 5, to employ paid or unpaid agents, staff or advisers.
- 4.19To enter into contracts to provide services to or on behalf of other bodies.
- 4.20To establish or acquire subsidiary companies to assist or act as agents for the Charity.
- 4.21To pay the costs of forming the Charity.
- 4.22To do anything else within the law which promotes or helps to promote the Objects.
- 5. <u>Benefits to Members and Trustees</u>
 - 5.1 The property and funds of the Charity must be used only for promoting the Objects and do not belong to the **members** but:
 - members who are not Trustees may be employed by or enter into contracts with the Charity and receive reasonable payment for goods or services supplied;
 - (2) members (including Trustees) may be paid interest at a reasonable rate on money lent to the Charity;
 - (3) members (including Trustees) may be paid a reasonable rent or hiring fee for property or equipment let or hired to the Charity; and
 - (4) members (including Trustees) who are also **beneficiaries** may receive charitable benefits in that capacity.
 - (5) payments may be made by the Charity to the employer of any Trustee in order to release the Trustee from his contractual obligations to that employer provided that this is necessary to allow the Trustee to dedicate time to the administration of the Charity and the furtherance of its Objects.
 - 5.2 A Trustee must not receive any payment of money or other **material benefit** (whether directly or indirectly) from the Charity except:
 - as mentioned in clauses 4.17 (indemnity insurance), 5.1(2) (interest),
 5.1(3) (rent), 5.1(4) (charitable benefits), 5.3 (contractual payments) and 5.1(5) (payments to employers);

- (2) reimbursement of reasonable out-of-pocket expenses (including hotel and travel costs) actually incurred in the administration of the Charity;
- (3) an indemnity in respect of any liabilities properly incurred in running the Charity (including the costs of a successful defence to criminal proceedings);
- (4) payment to any company in which a Trustee has no more than a 1 per cent shareholding; and
- (5) in exceptional cases, other payments or benefits (but only with the written approval of the Commission in advance).
- 5.3 A Trustee may not be an employee of the Charity.
- 5.4 Whenever a Trustee has a personal interest in a matter to be discussed at a meeting of the Trustees or a committee, he or she must:
- declare an interest before the meeting or at the meeting before discussion begins on the matter;
- (2) be absent from the meeting for that item unless expressly invited to remain in order to provide information;
- (3) not be counted in the quorum for that part of the meeting; and
- (4) be absent during the vote and have no vote on the matter.
- 5.5 This clause may not be amended without the written consent of the Commission in advance.

6. Limited Liability

The liability of members is limited.

7. <u>Guarantee</u>

Every member promises, if the Charity is dissolved while he, she or it remains a member or within 12 months afterwards, to pay up to £1 towards the costs of dissolution and the liabilities incurred by the Charity while he or she was a member.

8. Dissolution

- 8.1 If the Charity is dissolved, the assets (if any) remaining after provision has been made for all its liabilities must be applied in one or more of the following ways:
- (1) by transfer to one or more other bodies established for exclusively charitable purposes within, the same as or similar to the Objects;
- (2) directly for the Objects or for charitable purposes which are within or similar to the Objects;
- (3) in such other manner consistent with charitable status as the Commission approve in writing in advance.
 - 8.2 A final report and statement of account must be sent to the Commission.

9. <u>Membership</u>

- 9.1 The Charity must maintain a register of **members**.
- 9.2 **Membership** of the Charity is open to any individual or to any organisation in urological practice interested in promoting the Objects who:
- (1) applies to the Charity in the form required by the Trustees;
- (2) is approved by the Trustees; and
- (3) signs the register of members or consents in writing to become a member either personally or (in the case of an organisation) through an authorised representative.
 - 9.3 The Trustees may establish different classes of membership (including **informal membership**), prescribe their respective voting rights, privileges and duties and set the amounts of any subscriptions.
 - 9.4 Membership is terminated if the member concerned:
- (1) gives **written** notice of resignation to the Charity;
- (2) dies or (in the case of an organisation) ceases to exist;
- (3) is more than three **months** in arrear in paying the relevant subscription, if any (but in such a case the member may be reinstated on payment of the amount due); or

- (4) is removed from membership by resolution of the Trustees on the ground that in their reasonable opinion the member's continued membership is harmful to the Charity. The Trustees may only pass such a resolution after notifying the member in writing and considering the matter in the light of any written representations which the member concerned puts forward within 14 **clear days** after receiving notice.
 - 9.5 Membership of the Charity is not transferable.
 - 9.6 The Trustees may from time to time elect any persons who shall sign a written consent to their election to be honorary members for life or for such other period as the Trustees may determine. Honorary members shall be entitled to such rights as members as the Trustees may determine.

10. General Meetings

- 10.1Members are entitled to attend general meetings in person or by proxy (but only if the appointment of the proxy is in writing and notified to the Charity before the commencement of the meeting) or (in the case of a member organisation) by an authorised representative. General meetings are called on at least 21 clear days' written notice specifying the business to be discussed.
- 10.2There is a quorum at a general meeting if the number of members or authorised representatives present in person or by proxy is at least twenty of the voting members.
- 10.3 The Trustees may make whatever arrangements they consider appropriate to enable those attending a general meeting to exercise their rights to speak and vote at it.
- 10.4In determining attendance at a general meeting, it is immaterial whether any two or more Members attending it are in the same place as each other.
- 10.5Two or more persons who are not in the same place as each other attend a general meeting if their circumstances are such that if they have (or were to have) rights to speak and vote at that meeting, they are (or would be able) to exercise them.

- 10.6The **President** or (if the President is unable or unwilling to do so) some other member elected by those present presides at a general meeting.
- 10.7Except where otherwise provided by the **Articles** or the **Companies Act**, every issue is decided by a majority of the votes cast.
- 10.8Every voting member present in person or by proxy or through an authorised representative has one vote on each issue.
- 10.9Except where otherwise provided by the Articles or the Companies Act, a written resolution (whether an ordinary resolution or a special resolution) is as valid as an equivalent resolution passed at a general meeting. For this purpose the written resolution may be set out in more than one document.
- 10.10Except at first, The Charity must hold an **AGM** in every year. The first AGM must be held within 18 months after the Charity's incorporation.

10.11At an AGM the members:

- (1) receive the accounts of the Charity for the previous financial year;
- (2) receive the Trustees' report on the Charity's activities since the previous AGM;
- accept the retirement of those Trustees who wish to retire or who are retiring at the end of their term of office;
- receive the results of any ballot for election of Trustees and Council members to fill the vacancies arising;
- (5) appoint auditors for the Charity;
- (6) may confer on any individual (with his or her consent) the honorary title of Patron; and
- (7) may discuss and determine any issues of policy or deal with any other business put before them by the Trustees.
 - 10.12A general meeting may be called at any time by the Trustees and must be called within 28 clear days on a written request from at least 5% of the voting members.
- 11. The Trustees

- 11.1The Trustees as **charity trustees** have control of the Charity and its property and funds.
- 11.2 The Trustees when complete will consist of at least six and not more than 10 individuals.

The length of most appointments is to be 2 or 3 years.

- 11.3 Six Trustees shall be the officers of the Charity elected initially by the voting members by ballot:
- 11.3.1 The honorary treasurer elect acts for 2 years as such and then automatically becomes the treasurer for another 2 years without a vote being necessary for this conversion.
- 11.3.2 The honorary secretary elect acts for 2 years as such and then automatically becomes the secretary for another 2 years without a vote being necessary for this conversion.
- 11.3.3 The vice president is vice president for 2 years and then automatically becomes president for 2 years without a vote being necessary for this conversion.
- 11.3.4 If more than one candidate is in nomination for an elected post, the election of such Trustee shall be decided by a ballot among the voting members conducted in accordance with the Rules.
 - 11.4Up to four Trustees (of whom up to two may be lay Trustees not qualified to be voting members of the Charity normally) may be appointed by the Trustees for a maximum initial term of three years.
 - 11.5 Every Trustee after appointment or reappointment must sign a declaration of willingness to act as a charity trustee of the Charity before he or she may vote at any meeting of the Trustees.
- 11.6A retiring Trustee may be reappointed up to a maximum of 5 years in the same role.
 - 11.7A Trustee's term of office automatically terminates if he or she:
- (1) is disqualified under the Charities Act from acting as a charity trustee;
- (2) is incapable, whether mentally or physically, of managing his or her own affairs;

- (3) is absent without notice from 3 consecutive meetings of the Trustees and is asked by a majority of the other Trustees to resign;
- (4) ceases to be a member;
- (5) resigns by written notice to the Trustees (but only if at least two Trustees will remain in office);
- (6) is removed by resolution of the members present and voting at a general meeting after the meeting has invited the views of the Trustee concerned and considered the matter in the light of any such views.
 - 11.8The Trustees may at any time co-opt any individual to fill a vacancy in their number or as an additional Trustee, but a co-opted Trustee holds office only until the next AGM.
 - 11.9A technical defect in the appointment of a Trustee of which the Trustees are unaware at the time does not invalidate decisions taken at a meeting.

12. Trustees' proceedings

12.1The Trustees must hold at least 3 meetings each year.

- 12.2A quorum at a meeting of the Trustees is a majority of the Trustees then in office or 5, whichever is the greater.
- 12.3A meeting of the Trustees may be held either in person or by suitable electronic means agreed by the Trustees in which all participants may communicate with all the other participants.
- 12.4The President or (if the President is unable or unwilling to do so) some other Trustee chosen by the Trustees present presides at each meeting.
- 12.5Every issue may be determined by a simple majority of the votes cast at a meeting, but a written resolution signed by all the Trustees is as valid as a resolution passed at a meeting. For this purpose the resolution may be contained in more than one document and will be treated as passed on the date of the last signature.
- 12.6Except for the chair of the meeting, who has a second or casting vote, every Trustee has one vote on each issue.

12.7A procedural defect of which the Trustees are unaware at the time does not invalidate decisions taken at a meeting.

13. <u>Trustees' powers</u>

The Trustees have the following powers in the administration of the Charity:

- 13.1To appoint (and remove) any individual (who may be a Trustee) to act as Secretary in accordance with the Companies Act.
- 13.2To appoint such other honorary officers in addition to those prescribed in Article 11 and the Rules from among the membership.
- 13.3To delegate any of their functions to committees consisting of two or more individuals appointed by them. Unless the Trustees determine otherwise, one member of every committee must be a Trustee and all proceedings of committees must be reported promptly to the Trustees.
- 13.4To make such Rules consistent with the Articles and the Companies Act as they may deem necessary or expedient or convenient for the proper conduct and management of the Charity.
- 13.5To make standing orders consistent with the Articles and the Companies Act and the Rules to govern proceedings at general meetings, their proceedings and proceedings of committees.
- 13.6To make regulations consistent with the Articles and the Companies Act to govern the administration of the Charity and the use of its seal (if any).
- 13.7To establish procedures to assist the resolution of disputes or differences within the Charity.
- 13.8To exercise any powers of the Charity which are not reserved to a general meeting.
- 13.9To change the name of the Charity subject to the Commission's prior written approval.

14. Records and Accounts

14.1The Trustees must comply with the requirements of the Companies Act and of the Charities Act as to keeping financial records, the audit of accounts and the preparation and transmission to the Registrar of Companies and the **Commission** of:

- (1) annual returns;
- (2) annual reports; and
- (3) annual statements of account.

14.2The Trustees must keep proper records of:

- (1) all proceedings at general meetings;
- (2) all proceedings at meetings of the Trustees;
- (3) all reports of committees; and
- (4) all professional advice obtained.
 - 14.3Accounting records relating to the Charity must be made available for inspection by any Trustee at any time during normal office hours and may be made available for inspection by members who are not Trustees if the Trustees so decide.
 - 14.4A copy of the Charity's latest available statement of account must be supplied on request to any Trustee or member. A copy must also be supplied, within two months, to any other person who makes a written request and pays the Charity's reasonable costs.

15. <u>Notices</u>

- 15.1Notices under the Articles may be sent by hand, by post or by suitable electronic means or (where applicable to members generally) may be published in any suitable journal or any journal distributed by the Charity or on the Charity's website.
- 15.2The only address at which a member is entitled to receive notices sent by post is an address shown in the register of members.
- 15.3Any notice given in accordance with these Articles is to be treated for all purposes as having been received:
- 24 hours after being sent by electronic means, posted on the Charity's website or delivered by hand to the relevant address;
- (2) two clear days after being sent by first class post to that address;
- three clear days after being sent by second class or overseas post to that address;
- (4) on the date of publication of a newspaper containing the notice;

- (5) on being handed to the member (or, in the case of a member organisation, its authorised representative) personally; or, if earlier,
- (6) as soon as the member acknowledges actual receipt.
 - 15.4A technical defect in the giving of notice of which the Trustees are unaware at the time does not invalidate decisions taken at a meeting.
- 16. <u>Interpretation</u>
- 16.1 In these Articles, unless the context indicates another meaning:

'AGM' means an annual general meeting of the Charity;

'area of benefit' means worldwide;

'the Articles' means the Charity's articles of association;

'authorised representative' means an individual who is authorised by a member organisation to act on its behalf at meetings of the Charity and whose name is given to the Secretary;

'beneficiaries' means anyone working or volunteering within the field of urological surgery regardless of qualification;

'the Charity' means the company governed by the Articles;

'the Charities Act' means the Charities Act 2011;

'charity trustee' has the meaning prescribed by section 177 of the Charities Act;

'clear day' means 24 hours from midnight following the relevant event;

'the Commission' means the Charity Commission for England and Wales;

'the Companies Act' means the Companies Act 2006;

'connected person' means any spouse, partner, parent, child, brother, sister, grandparent or grandchild of a Trustee, any **firm** of which a Trustee is a member or employee, and any company of which a Trustee is a director, employee or shareholder having a beneficial interest in more than 1 per cent of the share capital;

'custodian' means a person or body who undertakes safe custody of assets or of documents or records relating to them; 'electronic means' include electronic form (for example, e-mail, telephone or video conference) or any other means while in electronic form (for example, sending a disk through the post);'financial expert' means an individual, company or firm who is authorised to give investment advice under the Financial Services and Markets Act 2000;

'financial year' means the Charity's financial year;

'firm' includes a limited liability partnership;

'indemnity insurance' means insurance against personal liability incurred by any Trustee for an act or omission which is or is alleged to be a breach of trust or breach of duty, unless the Trustee concerned knew that, or was reckless whether, the act or omission was a breach of trust or breach of duty;

'informal membership' refers to a supporter who may be called a 'member' but is not a company member of the Charity.

'material benefit' means a benefit which may not be financial but has a monetary value;

'member' and 'membership' refer to company membership of the Charity;

'Memorandum' means the Charity's Memorandum of Association;

'month' means calendar month;

'nominee company' means a corporate body registered or having an established place of business in England and Wales;

'the Objects' means the Objects of the Charity as defined in clause 3 of the Articles;

'President' means the President of the Charity who shall be the chair of the Trustees;

'Secretary' means the company secretary of the Charity;

'taxable trading' means carrying on a trade or business for the principal purpose of raising funds and not for the purpose of actually carrying out the Objects, the profits of which are subject to corporation tax;

'Trustee' means a director of the Charity and 'Trustees' means the directors.

'written' or 'in writing' refers to a legible document on paper including a fax message or the representation of words, symbols or other information in a visible form by any method or combination of methods, whether sent or supplied by electronic means or otherwise;

'year' means calendar year.

- 17.2 Expressions defined in the Companies Act have the same meaning.
- 17.3 References to an Act of Parliament are to that Act as amended or re-enacted from time to time and to any subordinate legislation made under it.
