MEDAL WINNER BIOGRAPHIES



St Paul's Medal

Rajeev T P

Professor Rajeev T P holds tenure as the Professor and Head, Department of Urology and Renal Transplantation, Gauhati Medical College, Assam, India.

He undertook his Medical training (MBBS) and Post Graduation in General Surgery (Masters in Surgery) at the same Medical College before specializing in Urology (Master in Chirurgiae-M.Ch) at the premier All-India Institute of Medical Sciences, New Delhi, India. He was the recipient of the Gold Medal for M.Ch (Urology) from All-India Institute of Medical Sciences.

Professor Rajeev has undertaken Fellowship in Endourology, Laparoscopic and Robotic Urology at the University of Minnesota, Minneapolis, USA where he is also a Visiting Professor.

He is an Educator and Supervisor for the Higher specialist training in Urology leading to the M.Ch in Urology for the University of Health Sciences, Assam and also to the various M.Ch and DNB (Urology) centers in India. He sits on the panel of Examiners for the M.Ch and DNB Higher specialist training programs in Urology across various Universities in India.

He holds senior positions for the Government of India, Medical Council of India and the National Board of Examinations, with his portfolio including assessing Urology services in various centers and helping bench marking training quality for Urology in India. He is a member of the Sub Speciality Board in Reconstructive Urology of the National Board of Examinations, Govt of India.

He has had a major role in helping develop the framework for the Government of India's Ayushman Bharat Scheme (for Urology), thereby improving access to specialist Urological health care for patients who were considered to be below the poverty line. This program helped bridge the divide between accessibility to healthcare balancing with the availability and provision of healthcare; utilizing the capacity in the private sector but with minimizing cost under this scheme.

He is an enthusiastic innovator believing in using technology and low-cost modifications to help improve health care delivery, reducing morbidity and mortality and developing simulation for training through his Faculty role with Uro medical Technology, Training and Simulation and cadaveric programs of the Indian School of Urology.

Professor Rajeev was instrumental in forming the Youth Wing (YOU) of the Urological Society of India during his tenure as Secretary General. Now this Youth wing is the back bone of the Urological Society of India. Further, he has started an exclusive section for Women Urologists of India during the annual congress of Urological Society of India which has created an overwhelming enthusiasm among the female Urologists.

Professor Rajeev T P has published over 120 peer reviewed articles and has been an invited Speaker to more than 15 International organizations. He is currently the Scientific Chair, Societe Internationale d'Urologie and also the Treasurer, South Asian Association of Urological Surgeons.

Above all, Professor Rajeev is a well-known cricketer and he has represented the University cricket, State Schools and the Assam state in Ranji Trophy and won lot of accolades.



St Peter's Medal

James N'Dow

James N'Dow gained his medical degree in the University of Aberdeen, Scotland, UK; where he is now Professor of Urological Surgery and Director of the Academic Urology Unit. He is appointed to the first Chair of Urological Surgery in Aberdeen's 528-year history as a medical school. Prof N'Dow is also Adjunct Secretary General at the European Association of Urology (EAU) with over 19,000 members globally. In this role, he has responsibility for the European School of Urology, European Urology Scholarship Programme, the EAU Young Urology Office with 2500 young surgeon members, the EAU Patient Office, the European Urology Accredited Continuing Medical Education Programme as well as the European Association of Urology Guidelines Office. He was Chairman of the Clinical Practice Guidelines Office Board of the EAU for 7 years before demitting office in July 2021. Under his leadership, the EAU Guidelines have become the most comprehensive and most trusted urological surgical practice guidelines globally; they are now endorsed by over 75 countries.

He was Co-ordinating Editor within the Cochrane Collaboration from 2008 – 2012; prior to that, he was Editor within the Cochrane Collaboration for a number of years. His research interests are in Global health, evidence-based practice, large observational studies and multicentre randomised clinical trials with a competitive research grant income of over GBP£43 million with publications in high impact journals such as the Lancet and New England Journal of Medicine. He is coordinator of two large European Commission funded projects, PIONEER €12M (38 partners across 9 countries; prostate cancer focus) and OPTIMA €21.3M (38 partners across 13 countries; breast cancer, lung cancer and prostate cancer focus). He has returned to The Gambia several times a year since 2001 to provide charitable surgical services in the public government hospitals and maternal health centres in The Gambia, taking along teams of healthcare providers with him. Prof N'Dow soon realised after years of charitable work that this was not the longterm solution to sustainable quality health system strengthening in low resource settings; the poor (especially pregnant mothers) still lacked access to affordable quality healthcare and charitable efforts were not sustained. He therefore founded Horizons (http://www.horizonstrustuk.org), an innovative social enterprise model designed to be a catalyst for sustainable systemic and permanent transformation of maternal and infant healthcare in West Africa and beyond, piloting in The Gambia first to learn lessons.

Professor N'Dow is trustee for the University of Aberdeen Development Trust. He is also co-Founder and Managing Director of the Urological CANcer Scottish charity (UCAN; https://www.ucanaberdeen.com/). UCAN has now raised over GBP£7 million so far (cash and in-kind) and funded the opening of the first Urological Cancer Care Centre in Scotland co-located with the acute urology services, formally launched by the Health Minister in 2008. He has contributed to the UK National Institute of Clinical Excellence (NICE Guidelines), UK Urology Specialty Advisory Committee, and he was Trustee for British Journal of Urology International from 2009 - 2014. Professor N'Dow has a Urological Surgical practice in the University of Aberdeen Teaching Hospitals/ NHS Grampian, sub-specialising in penile surgery.

In 2022, James was honoured to have been appointed as Deputy Lieutenant of the County of Aberdeenshire.



Gold Medal

Abhay Rane OBE

Abhay Rane MS FRCSGlasg(Urol) graduated from Poona University in India in 1983, and trained in urology in the United Kingdom and the United States. He was appointed to his current post as Consultant Urological Surgeon at Surrey and Sussex NHS Trust in 1999.

In the College he has served as Vice President (Surgical), Ordinary Councillor, Associate Director (International) and Regional Advisor.

He is Visiting Professor at Canterbury Christchurch University, Kent and Clinical Professor at two prestigious US Universities: Keck School of Medicine at the University of Southern California and the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai, New York. He is an advisor to the National Institute of Clinical Excellence (NICE) and has worked as the national urology representative to the NICE Interventional Procedures Advisory Committee. He is elected to the Board of the European Section of Uro – Technology of the European Association of Urology and is a Director of the Endourological Society. A former Council member of the British Association of Urological Surgeons (BAUS), he represents BAUS at the International Member Committee of the American Urological Association.

Abhay was appointed by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II as Officer of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire in the 2014 Honours List for services to laparoscopic surgery.

He has keen interests in surgical education, training and mentoring and the role that College performs nationally and internationally in these contexts.






Karl Storz Golden Telescope

Grant Stewart

Grant Stewart is Professor of Surgical Oncology at the University of Cambridge, where he has a focus on developing and promoting surgery related clinical trials and translational research. As a urological surgeon, Grant has a specific interest in optimising management of patients with initially localised renal cancer, an area of great need within the disease. He provides all modes of treatment for kidney cancer, from major open surgery to robotic minimally invasive approaches. In 2016 Grant developed the robotic kidney surgery programme in Cambridge and now leads the multi-speciality robotic surgery programme.



Grant leads the CRUK Cambridge Centre Clinical Cabinet and the Urological Malignancy and Integrated Cancer Medicine Programmes. He has been a key lead in renewal of the CRUK Cambridge Cancer Centre, the NIHR BRC4, REF (Cambridge ranking 1st for Medicine) and development of the clinical and research elements of the new Cambridge Cancer Research Hospital. He is Chair of the Science and Education Committee and a trustee of TUF, where with BAUS he developed the TUF Clinical Trials Unit. As trustee for Kidney Cancer UK, he has led the Kidney Cancer Accord which has led to approval of a much-needed NICE guideline for kidney cancer. He chairs the Kidney Cancer Pathway for the GIRFT Academy, is Deputy Editor of The Surgeon and Section Editor of the BJU International.

He is passionate about clinical and academic training and Director of the Academic Clinical Fellow Programme in Cambridge, the UK's largest ACF programme.

Grant has received multiple accolades: King James IVth Professorship 2022 (RCSEd), John Fitzpatrick Award 2022 (Kidney Cancer Association), Honorary Professor University of Leeds, elected member of Association of Academic European Urologists and James IV Association of Surgeons Travelling Fellow 2022.

Suzanne Biers

Suzanne Biers is a consultant at Addenbrookes Hospital in Cambridge subspecialising in female, functional and reconstructive urology. She graduated from St. George's Hospital Medical School, University of London, with the Brackenbury Prize in Surgery, and completed an MD degree in Oxford, receiving the BAUS John Blandy Award for research publications in 2007.

Suzanne's commitment to education is reflected in her roles as co-author and co-editor of 7 textbooks, including the Oxford Handbook of Urology, since the 1st edition in 2002 up to her current work as lead author on the 5th edition. She has been Course Director on 8 different surgical simulation courses, including the Cambridge Emergency Urology Surgical Skills Course which Suzanne is now developing as a national project with BAUS in her role as Lead. She also contributes to functional and reconstructive courses for doctors at all levels working in urology, general surgery and gynaecology.

She has been a Clinical Lead for the 2-year Urology Master's Degree at Anglia Ruskin University from its initiation in 2014, helping to equip early years training doctors with a broad urology knowledge base and experience of research and publication.

Suzanne has been Deputy Training Programme Director in the East of England Deanery since 2018 and was previously the local Clinical Lead for urology trainees. She received the BAUS Silver Cystoscope Regional Award for training in 2021. She has been faculty on a range of BAUS courses including the Core Urology and FRCS Revision Courses since 2011 and has recently been appointed BAUS co-lead for Specialist Trainees. Suzanne continues as Secretary of BAUS FNUU Section and Section Lead for Education. She has published national consensus documents on challenging functional problems and has contributed to national practice through her work on the NICE Urinary Incontinence and Prolapse Guidelines. She is the Eastern Region NIHR Urology Champion for Research and is active as both Principal and Sub-Investigator in national studies.

Suzanne is very grateful for the tremendous opportunities that a career in Urology provides. She is privileged to work with so many inspiring colleagues and trainees and extends her huge gratitude to everyone who has given their time, knowledge and expertise to collaborate with her.

The Urology Foundation Guest Lecture

Sir Thomas Hughes-Hallett

Sir Thomas Hughes-Hallett's involvement in charities began in the 1990s when he became a trustee, and later Chairman, of the Michael Palin Centre for Stammering Children. In 2000 he was appointed Chief Executive of Marie Curie Cancer Care. Over the next 12 years he led the organisation through a period of significant change, which saw diversification of their activities and the charity becoming a household name.

In 2012 he was knighted in the Queen's Birthday Honour's List for his services to Philanthropy and in 2013 was presented with the prestigious Beacon Fellowship for Philanthropy Advocacy. He is the founder and Chair of Helpforce charity and co-founder of The Marshall Institute within the London School of Economics and Political Science. He is also the former Chair of Chelsea and Westminster Hospital NHS Foundation Trust, a former Trustee of The Esmée Fairbairn Foundation and The King's Fund, and sat on the Board of the Westminster Abbey Foundation. Sir Thomas has served the Department of Health as a Chair or member of a number of advisory boards. He is now Chair of the John Innes Centre, an independent, international centre of excellence in plant science, genetics and microbiology

Nigel Acheson

Nigel Acheson is Regional Medical Director and Higher-Level Responsible Officer for the South Region of NHS England. With a population of 13.4 million, the Region stretches from Cornwall to Kent and includes the cities of Bristol, Oxford and Southampton.

Born in Belfast, Nigel trained in Birmingham and was appointed as a consultant gynaecological oncologist in 2002, moving to the Royal Devon and Exeter (RD&E) Hospital in Exeter to help develop the Gynaecological Cancer Centre there and learn to sail.

From his time as a National Advisor and Clinical Lead to the Department of Health's Enhanced Recovery Partnership Programme, Nigel actively promotes the involvement of patients as partners in their care. Whilst Medical Director for the Peninsula Cancer Network in the Southwest of England, Nigel helped to reestablish the patient and public group with the chair and vice-chair becoming members of the network Board.

BAUS Guest Lecture

Mo Belal

Mr Mo Belal is a Consultant Urological Surgeon; Queen Elizabeth Hospital, Birmingham since 2011 with a specialist interest in Female, Functional, Neuro-urology and Urinary tract reconstruction. He is the current chair of the BAUS Section of FNUU. He is currently working with NHS England representing BAUS as the Mesh lead.

Whilst cycling with a friend, he was struck by a tree resulting in a spinal cord injury and paralysis in February 2021. After multiple operations and 8 months in hospital with over 1000 hours of rehabilitation he has returned to his career as a urological surgeon. He will share his insights from his injury and the journey back to work.





Journal of Clinical Urology (JCU) Guest Lecture

Omer Karim

Omer was born in Omdurman in the Sudan of Sudanese and Irish parents. He lived in the Sudan until he was five years old and then went to West Germany where his father was a Cultural Attaché, looking after students all over Europe. In 1968, the family moved to the UK. At King's Macclesfield he became Head Boy, played rugby for Cheshire U19 and then went to Charing Cross Hospital Medical School where he was captain of the First XV.

Following his FRCS he did research at the Brady Institute of Urology, Johns Hopkins Medical Institutions for his MSc. He was an SR at the Royal London and subsequently was appointed a Consultant Urologist in 1995 to East Berkshire. He developed an expertise in nerve sparing radical prostatectomy and converted to robotic assisted surgery in 2004. He has published over 100 peer-reviewed papers and performed over 3,500 robotic assisted operations.

He has been a proctor in robotic assisted surgery since 2008, and regularly teaches surgeons in the UK and Europe. He has taught in South Africa, India and Turkey. He has been elected to Council of the Royal College of Surgeons of England and the British Medical Association. In 2021, he was the first doctor to successfully sue the General Medical Council for racial discrimination, although the GMC has since appealed the ET judgement.

Apart from medicine, he has been involved in business, floating a small medical diagnostic company on AIM in 2000 which was subsequently sold to Laborie. In 2000, he also set up a private diagnostic outpatient facility (www.bridge-clinic.com) in Maidenhead.

He speaks basic Arabic and German and fluent French. He has Irish, British and Sudanese nationalities. He is married with two children. In his spare time, he cycles, grows cacti and succulents, and is a beekeeper.

Presentation: Each film-coated tablet contains 300 mg of darolutamide. Indication(s): NUBEQA is indicated for the

treatment of adult men with non-metastatic castration resistant prostate cancer (nmCRPC) who are at high risk of developing metastatic disease or with metastatic hormone-sensitive prostate cancer (mHSPC) in combination with docetaxel. **Posology &** method of administration: Treatment should be initiated and supervised by a specialist physician experienced in treatment of prostate cancer. 

In the event of discovering a fire in your vicinity:


- 1) Raise the alarm by breaking the glass in the fire alarm call point.
