I am both delighted and honoured to be able to welcome you to this year's BAUS Annual Scientific Meeting here in Manchester.

This session is immediately followed by the BAUS guest lecture, and I'm delighted that we will be able to welcome the Academy award-winning director Sir Steve McQueen CBE who will be sharing his prostate cancer journey and hopes for the future.

This is absolutely not to be missed!

On Tuesday we are privileged to be able to welcome The Rt Hon. Lord Ara Darzi of Denham OM KBE, who has very kindly agreed to deliver the BAUS & JCU Guest Lecture entitled, "Rebuilding the NHS and Targeting Health Inequalities" Again I think this is one of those lectures that all of us have something to gain and learn from and I look forward to seeing as many of you as possible in the audience.

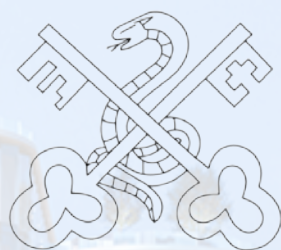
Manchester is one of the most vibrant cities in the country and to be able to host our annual meeting here after an absence of 10 years is something we are all massively excited about.

The BAUS Trustees, led by President Ian Pearce, along with Lisa Dodgson, Iqbal Shergill, Mo Belal, Shabi Ahmed, Rachel Morrison, Tharani Nitkunan, and Mahua Sahu, have worked tirelessly to ensure that members gain both scientific enrichment and a fantastic social experience—all while keeping the cost of attendance as accessible as possible.

We are also deeply grateful to our industry sponsors and collaborative charities for their generous support, which helps make this conference possible.

Over the next three days, we have an exciting lineup of 85 sessions, featuring 5 Guest Lectures, 7 Satellite Symposia and 18 e-Poster Sessions & Display posters.

A huge thank you to the 70 Abstract markers, who meticulously reviewed nearly 600 abstracts. Due to the high volume of exceptional submissions from the UK and beyond, we are continuing with the 8 AM poster sessions alongside additional display posters. With nearly 110 session chairs, 200 speakers, and 20 international experts, [#BAUS25](#) is set to deliver an equitable, representative, and multidisciplinary programme that spans the breadth of urology sub-specialties and perspectives.

Each day begins with stand-alone plenary sessions, featuring:

- **Monday: Sir Steve McQueen**, the acclaimed artist and filmmaker, sharing his personal journey with prostate cancer.
- **Tuesday: Rt Hon. Lord Ara Darzi of Denham OM KBE**, offering insights into the challenges facing the NHS and the potential Health Plan.
- **Wednesday: The Rt. Hon Wes Streeting**, Secretary of State for Health, and Social Care sharing his personal experience of cancer treatment in the NHS and his hopes for the NHS. Our Widening Participation session with **Peaches Golding OBE, CStJ His Majesty's Lord Lieutenant for The County and City of Bristol**, sharing her expertise in overcoming unconscious bias.

In addition to our plenary sessions, [#BAUS25](#) will host engaging discussions with intrigue (managing multi-morbid patients, realistic medicine in andrology), challenging Cross-Specialty Sessions (exploring neuro-urology, evidence, and mixed LUTS), dilemmas (key debates in benign andrology) updates (advances in penile cancer, paediatric urology, FNUU, and bladder cancer), health Policy (covering GIRFT and NHS England) and BSoT & SSTU sessions which will engage us and create thought-provoking discussions on emerging trends.

As part of our ongoing BAUS membership projects, we will hear from expert speakers on well-being and longevity, offering valuable insights into work-life balance, prioritisation, and resilience. Additionally, in collaboration with the International British Urology Society (IBUS), we will explore a global training project for senior residents and early-career consultants. Senior leaders from India, Egypt, Central & Southern Africa, and the Middle East will share international training opportunities available to BAUS members.

Attendees will also have the opportunity to explore the exhibition area, set within the historic former Manchester Central railway station, known for its distinctive arched roof and clock.

A special thank you to Mo Belal & Ian Pearce whose valuable insights have helped shape what I believe will be an outstanding 80th BAUS Conference.

I look forward to welcoming you all to Manchester, engaging in meaningful discussions, and sharing our vision for the future of BAUS as I continue to serve as President (Elect).

We are very much looking forward to seeing everyone back in Manchester for what looks to be an excellent BAUS 2025. There is a wide variety on offer from the Endourology section this year, covering the breadth of our subspecialty, including stone disease, BPH and upper tract urothelial cancer. 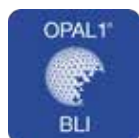

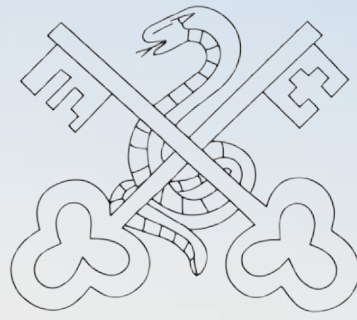

Outline and Objectives

Point of care ultrasound scanning (POCUS) is fast becoming an important skill across medicine, to improve bedside patient assessment, both in the emergency & elective setting. To this end, this course will allow delegates to be taught hands on ultrasound scanning technique of the kidneys, bladder and testes, in small groups of three, with a faculty member. We have arranged for patients who have appropriate pathologies, to be present as subjects for scanning. High end ultrasound machines will be provided by Fujifilm (formerly Hitachi). The aim is to help candidates in becoming confident in level 1 urological ultrasound scanning, i.e. being able to recognise normal anatomy, detecting when something is abnormal and referring on for further imaging.

The following areas will be covered within this course:

- Technique of performing an ultrasound scan of the kidneys, urinary bladder, testes and transabdominal scan of the prostate (measuring prostate volume)
- How to optimise an ultrasound image, using the common machine knobs controlling overall gain, time-gain compensation, focus, depth and scanning frequency
- Recognition of the normal appearance of the kidneys, urinary bladder, testes and prostate
- Recognition of some of these common abnormalities within the urinary tract:
 - › Renal cysts
 - › Hydronephrosis
 - › Renal stones
 - › Small renal masses
 - › Thick walled bladder & trabeculation
 - › Prostate enlargement, median lobe of the prostate
 - › Epididymal cysts
 - › Hydrocele
 - › Varicocele
